Rayleigh Town Council

Rayleigh is a market town with a population of over 30,000 people. It is one of the largest towns in the county and is one of 14 parishes within the Rochford District. The central part of Rayleigh is a conservation area and consists of several listed buildings.

The Town Council was formed in 1996 with twenty three Councillors. There are seven wards and are served as below

Nine of the twenty three members are also Rochford District Council Councillors and two are Essex County Council Councillors.

The Town Council employs four members of staff. The Town Clerk is Ms Elaine Ketley. The Council office is situated within the King George V Playing Field on Bull Lane, Rayleigh SS6 8JD. The office is open to the public from 9.00am to 3.30pm Monday to Friday.

The Council runs a committee system with regular Monday evening meetings at 7.30 pm. Members of the public and the press are welcome to attend all meetings, unless stated otherwise on the agenda. The public may participate in the discussions by invitation of the Chairman and during the public forum. Access to the Town Council office for evening meetings is via the Websters Way public car park.

Policy and Finance Committee

The Policy & Finance Committee has various responsibilities. These include the general governance of the Town Council such as finances, budgeting, Grants, Standing Orders and Financial Regulations. They look after the general administration of the Council, including the maintenance of the Town Council's premises at the Pavilion, insurance, communications, office equipment, staffing matters and the training of staff and Councillors. The Town Council is fortunate to now have an office consisting of our Town, Deputy, Finance and Committee Clerks.

The work of this Committee over the last year has included the following:

Improvements continue to the Council's communications with the public by the Town Council's website, and Facebook with further aims set out in our Community Engagement Strategy. Facilities are being sort to provide audio visual for meetings and Cloud based office systems are now in place.

The John Fisher site at Little Wheatley Chase has now been taken over by Rayleigh Town Council with Rayleigh Football Club now able to have football pitches here.

The Snack Bar rental within King George V Playing Field is in the process of being reviewed.

The Town Council strives to achieve 'best value' for all its expenditure, being responsible to ensure that we abide by our financial regulations, obtain value for money and obtain competitive prices for any work, goods or materials that are purchased. Where possible we endeavour to use the services of local businesses, employ local businesses and strive to obtain three quotations for any expenditure over £500 with contract tendering for higher cost projects.

The Town Council's finances are subjected to rigorous checks by internal and external auditors and we are very pleased that reports from these examinations have remained consistently good throughout this year. You will see a financial breakdown of our income and expenditure at the addendum to this report. We strive to obtain the best possible return from our invested reserves.

Budgets have been examined and the precept for the 2023/24 financial year will remain the same as the previous year at £473,405. The cost for the average Band D property remains unchanged and the lowest in the Rochford District.

The Town Council achieves good financial management by actively seeking sponsorship from local businesses for its floral displays, Christmas lights and Trinity Fair and by applying for grant funding for new projects wherever possible. We will continue to maintain our current services, which include funding for the Rayleigh Town Museum, arranging the Remembrance Day Parade, floral displays and maintenance of the King George V Playing Field and the Christmas Lights.

The Town Council has a budget for providing grants to local charities that provide a useful service for Rayleigh residents and have demonstrated that they are well run. Our Chairman has presented cheques to the following organisations:

Communities Committee

The Communities Committee was formed in 2023 to deal with a variety of subjects and most of its responsibilities are within the town, such as Christmas Lights, Markets, Floral Displays, Trinity Fair, Heritage Scheme and Community Safety. Our working groups hold regular meetings and are served by members of the public as well as Town Councillors.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Councillors, office staff and members of the public who take the time to attend meetings and help to arrange the events.

Coronation of King Charles III - Picnic in the Park

The Town Council decided to mark this historic event by hosting a free picnic in the King George V Playing Field. A large screen was hired to broadcast this event and members of the public were encouraged to attend and bring their picnics.

A limited number of local traders provided food and refreshments. Palmers Solicitors sponsored the supply of flags and reusable tote bags for those present. Despite the weather conditions approximately seven hundred residents attended to see the coronation of our new King. A local photobooth company attended and captured family and friends celebrating.

Anglia in Bloom

It was wonderful for the town to be awarded **GOLD** by the Anglia in Bloom judges, once again this year.

This working group held two tendering exercises this year for the provision and maintenance of our floral displays and management of rose and shrub beds in the town. We will continue to provide the town centre floral displays.

Christmas Lights and Event

It was wonderful to see the crowds of people at the Christmas lights switch on event. The lovely singing from the school choirs, the Mushroom Theatre Company and local singer Megan Rose really brought the community together to celebrate this very special time of year.

It was good to have BBC Essex presenters Steve Scruton and Ian Wyatt join us again, along with our very popular Town Crier Jim Shrubb.

This year the Town Council hired a larger stage for the event, and this gained many positive comments. Going forward this stage will be used at Trinity Fair.

Our thanks go to the volunteers, councillors and staff who marshalled at the event.

The Town Council tries to keep costs down by inviting sponsors to contribute and we are very grateful to all those who do so and especially to our main sponsors, Marco's Spanish Restaurant and Bar, Palmers Solicitors, Bestax, BTMK Solicitors, The Spread Eagle and Chamber of Trade.

Elouisa Neville of Wyburns Primary School drew a beautiful picture of the Dutch Cottage and was the winner of our competition to design the Chairman's Christmas Card. The winners of BTMK Colouring Competition were Stanley Hood-Karrer, Ruby Annie Bradford and Eva Wooderson. All our winners were presented with their prizes on stage at the event.

The members of the Christmas Lights Working Group judged the festive displays and hampers were kindly donated by Palmers Solicitors for each winner. The winners were: Charity Shop – Dogs Trust; Commercial Shop – Star Café Pie and Mash and Public House – The Half Moon.

This year lights were installed around the Town Clock on the corner of Bellingham Lane, and this created a selfie point at the event with many residents stopping to take photos with family and friends.

Looking After Our Vulnerable and Elderly Residents

Like many other busy shopping centres, unfortunately purse thefts occur from time to time. We have tried to combat this distressing criminal offence by issuing purse chains and bells free of charge to local groups, to help our elderly and vulnerable residents.

Rayleigh's Heritage

The Town Council cherishes Rayleigh's heritage, and we are very fortunate to have Mr Mike Davies, Chairman of Rayleigh Town Museum advise on historical matters and attend our meetings. The Town Council continues to support the Museum by paying the annual rent at 91 High Street. The Museum has proved to be very popular, and the many volunteers should be commended for their work on the variety of exhibitions and slide shows.

Our Town & Heritage Guide, which is distributed widely, as well as locally, will be updated to include the new heritage plaque to be installed at Rayleigh Primary School in due course. This will make a total of 33 heritage plaques in our town.

Rayleigh Markets

Rayleigh's Wednesday market continues to take place in the High Street every week. The stalls sell a huge variety of goods including bread and cakes, fruit n veg, groceries, homeware, clothing, shoes, plants, cut flowers, Avon and jewellery.

During the year we have accommodated a number of charity or public information stalls free of charge, this ranges from Dementia Awareness, Police, Megacentre, Lady MacAdden Breast Screening and Pre-loved School Clothing.

Trinity Fair

The Trinity Fair ran from 1227 to 1899 and was revived by the Town Council when it was held on a beautiful summers day in June 2017. This event is now a muchanticipated annual event for the community to celebrate all that is good about our town. My thanks go to Steven and Emma Cooper of Haddon Events for bringing all the stalls and entertainment and to the many local organisations who participated, including Holy Trinity Church, Rayleigh British Legion Club, Rayleigh Town Museum and Windmill Volunteers. To celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III a colouring competition was sponsored by Stacey's Auctioneers and the three winners were Emilia Pavitt, Phoebe Anderson and Sienna Smith.

A Children's Fancy Dress parade took place during the day, and this was sponsored by Palmers Solicitors.

Primary Schools General Knowledge Quiz

The year marked the return of the Primary School General Knowledge Quiz. This has not been held since 2019 due to the pandemic. The final took place on 11th March and the winners were Glebe Primary School. This year two pupils were awarded best individual pupil. The pupils were William Dulieu and Quinn McGee of Our Lady of Ransom Primary School. I would like to thank the Chamber of Trade, which very kindly sponsored the quiz by donating £100 prize money to the winning school. I thank Town Councillor Bruce Smart and his colleague Mr Colin Page for all their hard work on this and for producing such a variety of interesting questions.

Remembrance Parade and Service

Remembrance Day is a major Civic Event for Rayleigh Town Council and is organised by the Town Council in co-operation with Royal British Legion Club and Holy Trinity Church and other interested parties to ensure that our town can pay its respects on this very important day. The Town Council works closely with each organisation and funds the traffic management for the rolling roadblock to allow the parade to march safely through the town centre. Our thanks go to Mrs J Crick for her dedication and planning of this event.

Dementia Friendly Town

Rayleigh Town Council is aiming to make Rayleigh a Dementia Friendly Town. Cllr E Brewer has taken a vital role in this project and has promoted Dementia Awareness Week by displaying forget-me-nots around the town and holding a stall at the market to promote the campaign and give information to residents.

Community Speed Watch

The Town Council owns a Radar device and speed display board and can organise speed watch sessions. Community Speed Watch is a partnership between the local community, local authority and Essex Police. Volunteers must be trained to use speed detection devices. At present the Town Council has seven trained councillors who can arrange and conduct sessions throughout the year.

Easter Egg Hunt Competition

The Town Council will be holding the Easter Egg Hunt competition again this year where participants have to search for 10 Golden Eggs in town centre shop windows. This will take place from 28th March to 15th April 2024. Our Chairman will present prizes following the closing date. Palmers Solicitors and Squires will act as collection points for entry forms.

Public Footpaths

Mr Mike Davies continues to do an excellent job as our Public Footpaths representative and is constantly working to improve the pathways and to solve the numerous and varied problems that come his way.

Community Safety

Rochford District Council recently installed CCTV cameras in Rayleigh High Street the scheme was supported by Rayleigh Town Council. The Town Council provided funding towards the taxi marshals who operated in the taxi lagoon over the Christmas period.

Environment and Opens Spaces Committee

The Environment and Open Spaces Committee was formed in 2023. The main responsibilities of this committee are the King George V Playing Field, John Fisher playing field, 4 allotment sites, Lower Wyburns Woods, Crown Hill public toilets and maintain and look after the street furniture.

Street Furniture

The Town Council achieved match funding for the green furniture in the town centre to being repainted, to freshen up our town.

The Town Council owns eight bus shelters around the town and they have displays for community information in the bus shelter notice boards.

Allotments

The Town Council has 146 allotment plots at four sites around the town and there are waiting lists at most of the sites. If you are interested in having an allotment, please contact the office.

Lower Wyburns Woods

The Town Council has a long-term lease from the Woodland Trust to manage this 8 acre site on Daws Heath Road, which is adjacent to our allotment site.

John Fisher

The Town Council have taken over the lease for the John Fisher playing field. The council want to add more play equipment to the park and have been in consultation with the local primary schools to establish what the children would like.

Crown Hill Public Toilets

We are working in partnership with Rochford District Council, who owns the Crown Hill Public Toilets, in order to continue to provide toilet facilities for the public in the town centre. We have a 10 year lease of the new building, and are responsible for the cleaning and management of this facility.

King George V Playing Field

The King George V Playing Field is owned by the King George's Trust and all twenty three members of Rayleigh Town Council are Trustees.

The playing field is one of Rayleigh's most valuable resources and the Town Council endeavours to preserve and improve this asset.

This has been another very good year for the Trust. Our prestigious Green Flag status was renewed, for the 11th year running, we received Gold for the Large Town Category and Silver Gilt by the Anglia in Bloom judges in the Playing Fields/Parks category.

We work closely with Elm Horticultural Ltd, our grounds maintenance contractor, to keep up this high, award winning standard for our playing field and to consider improvements to make this an even more enjoyable place to visit.

The Town Clerk managed to secure match funding for new inclusive play equipment for the park which has now been installed.

The central location of the playing field makes it a very popular venue for events. Income is generated for the Trust from these bookings and from various other sources including the hire of the Pavilion by organisations for meetings, Rayleigh Town Council's rental of office accommodation on the first floor, the Snack Bar, Rayleigh Bowls Club's lease for use of the Pavilion and bowling green and local youth and adult football teams. All income received is used to help towards the costs of maintenance and improvement of the playing field and facilities.

The Skate Park and Teen Shelter continue to be very popular for young people and the majority treat all of the facilities in the playing field with respect. The Town Council employ the services of Essex County Council's Youth Workers to attend the Skate Park every Wednesday evening to discuss issues with the young people. Their work is very effective and has helped vulnerable individuals.

Rayleigh Bowls Club is situated within the playing field and rents part of the ground floor of the Pavilion as its base. With prior arrangement, you may hire one of the rinks for a game of bowls and, if you would like to play bowls, contact the Club for more information.

Snack Bar on the ground floor of the Pavilion is going through a change of leaseholder at the moment. Hopefully it will soon be open every day throughout the summer and at weekends in the winter.

The Town Council installed a defibrillator and bleed control kit on the exterior wall of the pavilion and these are accessible 24 hours a day.

The council paid for the new petanque to be built in the rose gardens after requests from residents. It continues to be well used.

I would like to thank the Town Council staff for their work over the last year.

Planning Committee

The Town Council is a statutory consultee for all planning applications submitted to the District Council by householders, businesses, and organisations such as Councils and schools in Rayleigh. Members of public can view planning applications online on Rochford District Council's website at www.rochford.gov.uk.

The Planning Committee examined and responded to planning applications that me the Town Council's criteria or are requested to be considered by members. Members of public have attended planning committee meetings over the last year to express their views on applications.

It is worth noting that if residents have an objection or concern on an application, they must submit their own response to Rochford District. The Town Council can only give an opinion to Rochford District Council and does not have the authority to approve or refuse an application.

Members of the Planning Committee may be invited to attend site visits by Rochford District Council when necessary and if required the committee chairman will attend Rochford District Council Development Committee meetings to speak on applications on the agenda.

It is important for local people's views to be represented fairly and consistently. An in-depth knowledge of the local area is extremely helpful when examining planning applications and formulating a response to the District Council.

The Town Council's Planning Committee meets every month to respond to the District Council within the consultation period.
